National History Project – following the successful national seminar in 2001 on teaching Australian History in schools, the 2002 national seminar is being held in Brisbane on April 17-19. By invitation only, the seminar will engage sixty or so curriculum specialists, systemic and service providers, teacher educators, academic historians and representatives of primary and secondary teaching in all states and territories in a discussion on “Global and regional histories”. The outcome will be a set of policies directives for enhancing the teaching of global, international and regional perspectives in the History curriculum. The annual seminar series is one of the programs funded after the May 2000 report on the *National Inquiry into School History* (DETYA). Unfortunately HENA (the History Educators' Network of Australia), another outcome of the National Inquiry, has withdrawn from offering a plenary session at the forthcoming AHA (and QHTA) conference in Brisbane. Other elements of the national program such as an On-line Journal, Curriculum materials, www site and a *National Centre for History Education* (located in Melbourne) have been established and are now being developed.

Pacific Island History Teachers' Network – Established with funding from the Sasakawa Pacific Islands Nations Fund of Japan, this network began in 1995. It is now located in Apia, Samoa. Dr Asofou So'o and the Western Samoan History Teachers' Association have managed the project, known as *HistoryCOPs*, since 2000. The project held its most recent workshop in Vanuatu with assistance from the Vanuatu Social Studies Teachers' Association. During the program, local associations have been founded, or revitalised in PNG, Solomon Islands, New Caledonia, Fiji, Kiribati, Tonga and the Cook Islands. Workshops will be held this year in Apia and Fiji. The *HistoryCOPs* project will also publish a *Guide for History Teachers on Museums and Cultural Centres*, and a *Guide for first-year History teachers*. A set of 23 National History posters continues to be distributed across the region. The QHTA has been an associate member of this network since its inception and regularly distributes copies of the QHTA journal *The History Teacher* to colleagues in the region.

The QHTA program runs all day on Friday, 5 July. 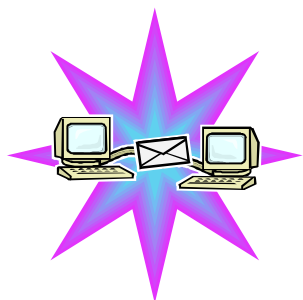

A unique and exciting feature of this site is that as well as captioned information about 'important events' associated with events at Gallipoli in 1915 there is a section called 'History,' where the historian who wrote the information reveals how it was written and some of the problems encountered.

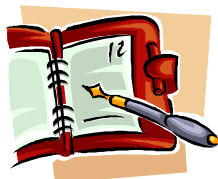
