
## Australia's Vietnam War The Hero in History and Social Forces


## **Vietnam Wars**

First Indochina War – 1946-1954

Second Indochina War – 1955-1975 – Australia's involvement (1962-72)

Third Indochina War – 1975-1991






Battle of Dien Bien Phu - May 1954.

Geneva Conference - July 1954. (Division of Vietnam at 17<sup>th</sup> Parallel; promised national elections in 1956; Vietnam, Laos & Cambodia to be neutral).

International Control Commission (Canada, Poland & India) 1954-1973.

USA refused to endorse accords and walked out on them.



"I am frankly of the belief that no amount of American military assistance in Indochina can conquer an enemy which is everywhere and at the same time nowhere, "an enemy of the people" which has the sympathy and covert support of the people."







Australia's longest war (1962-1975) until Afghanistan.

About 60,000 ADF served.

1962 – 30 advisors.

1964 – Menzies government introduced conscription for overseas service.

1965 – Committed a battalion (1RAR) of combat troops (800-1000).

1966 – Harold Holt committed 2nd battalion, including conscripts.


1967 – 8000 troops.

521 killed. About 3000 wounded.

First military commitment in which Britain was not involved.

Birth of the protest movement?
